Art as Activism: Creating Art for Social Change—Artists have often been at the forefront of activism, enhancing our understanding of social issues through a myriad of creative forms, such as songs, poems, street performances, signs and banners, and even something as simple as—a button. This workshop will explore how artists and everyday citizens creatively express themselves in times of social change by analyzing a few key historical examples of protest art *and* creating our own activist art in the form of buttons and signs.

Dr. Katherine Everhart earned her PhD in Sociology from Vanderbilt University and has been an Assistant Professor of Sociology at Tusculum University since 2017. Her dissertation examined the role of art and culture in the 62-day occupation of the University of Puerto Rico in 2010.

Stream Biomonitoring—What can aquatic insects tell us about the condition of our local creek? Come get your hands dirty in College Creek and learn how to sample aquatic insects, identify common groups, and use that information to understand the impact people have on stream ecosystems. Conor Keitzer, Assistant Professor of Environmental Science at Tusculum University, earned his Ph.D in aquatic science from Purdue University and worked for three years as a postdoctoral researcher in the Aquatic Ecology Lab at the Ohio State University. Conor has over a decade of experience working to understand and conserve our freshwater ecosystems and the animals that call them home. *Limited to 15 students

East Tennessee in the Civil War—Are you interested in your region's role in the U.S. Civil War? Although Tennessee voted to leave the Union in 1861, East Tennessee remained loyal to the Union, and was quickly occupied by Confederate forces. This workshop will explore the outbreak of the war and our region's unique position during the sectional conflict. We will read a variety of first-hand accounts describing life in-and-around Greeneville, as well as Confederates' efforts to root out Unionist sympathizers.

Dr. Jeffrey Perry received his Ph.D. in History from Purdue University and is currently an Assistant Professor of History at Tusculum University. He teaches courses on early America and the Civil War Era.

Political Jeopardy—Could you pass a U.S. citizenship test? Come show off your government knowledge. Join current Tusculum students and faculty to discover layers of historical and political understanding.

Dr. Mary Cooper is Assistant Professor of Political Science and Director of the Honors Program at Tusculum. She completed her M.A. in International Relations and Ph.D. in Political Science at Yale University.

Fabulism: Extending the Boundaries of Non-Realistic Artistic Fiction—Feel compelled to write about a nightly transformation into a deer, about growing up next door to a pack of wild boys, about joining the mermaids (and your mother) under the sea? Then you, too, might be a fabulist. Explore short stories that have literary merit *and* embrace the bizarre, and experiment with techniques for crafting fabulist stories. *Heather Elouej*, who earned an MFA in fiction writing from Washington University in St. Louis, is an Associate Professor of English. Elouej's fiction was selected by Michael Martone to receive an AWP Intro Award, and works of her short fiction have been published in such literary journals as *Conjunctions, Salt Hill, Cimarron Review, Cream City Review, DIAGRAM, Unstuck*, and elsewhere. She currently serves as Editor of *The Tusculum Review*.
